NOTICE OF PRIVACY PRACTICES

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THIS NOTICE DESCRIBES HOW MEDICAL INFORMATION ABOUT YOU MAY BE USED AND DISCLOSED AND HOW YOU CAN GET ACCESS TO THIS INFORMATION. PLEASE REVIEW IT CAREFULLY

WHO WILL FOLLOW THIS NOTICE

This Notice describes the practices of:

- Houston Medical Center
- Perry Hospital
- Houston Heart Institute
- Houston Healthcare Emergency Medical Services
- The Surgery Center
- Pavilion and Houston Lake Rehab
- Occupational Health & Wellness
- All Med-Stops
- Any Other facilities operated by Houston Healthcare
- Any healthcare professional authorized to enter information into your medical record maintained by Houston Healthcare, including members of Houston Healthcare's medical staff and allied health staff
- All departments and units of the Houston Healthcare that have access to your medical record
- Any member of a volunteer group we allow to help you while you are in Houston Medical Center, Perry Hospital, or any Houston Healthcare operated facility
- All employees, staff and other Houston Healthcare personnel

• All these persons, entities, sites, and locations follow the terms of this Notice. In addition, these persons, entities, sites, and locations may share medical information with each other for treatment, payment, or hospital operations purposes as described in this Notice.

OUR PLEDGE REGARDING MEDICAL INFORMATION

We understand that medical information about you and your health is personal. We are committed to protecting medical information about you. We create a record of the care and services you receive at Houston Healthcare. We need this record to provide you with quality care and to comply with certain legal requirements. This Notice applies to all of the records of your care and billing for that care that are generated or maintained by Houston Healthcare, whether made by Houston Healthcare personnel or other health care providers. Other health care providers may have different policies or notices regarding confidentiality and the use and disclosure of your medical information that apply to medical information created in their offices or at locations other than Houston Healthcare.

This Notice will tell you about the ways in which we may use and disclose medical information about you. We also describe your rights and certain obligations we have regarding the use and disclosure of your medical information.

We are required by law to:

- Make sure that medical information that identifies you is kept private;
- Give you this Notice of our legal duties and privacy practices at Houston Healthcare, and your legal rights, with respect to medical information about you;
- Notify you of any breach of your medical information; and
- Follow the terms of the Notice that is currently in effect.

HOW WE MAY USE AND DISCLOSE MEDICAL INFORMATION ABOUT YOU

If you do not give your consent for Houston Healthcare to use and disclose your medical information as outlined in this Notice, we will only use and disclose your medical information in the following circumstances:

- To providers who are personally involved in providing care pursuant to your consent to treatment (whether such consent is express, implied by law, or through substituted consent as authorized by law), but only during the period of time they are providing care to you;
- To bill you for the charges you incurred while you were a patient of Houston Healthcare;
- To third parties when required by law or by appropriate legal process issued by a court or governmental agency with jurisdiction;
- If you are a Medicare, Medicaid, CHAMPUS/TRICARE, or other federal or state program beneficiary or enrollee, for treatment and payment purposes as outlined in this Notice;
- In the case of an emergency, when we are transferring you to a receiving facility for care; and

• In the case of an emergency, in order to provide you with care that is required by federal and state law.

Should you give your consent; we will use and disclose your medical information as outlined in this Notice. The following categories describe different ways that we use and disclose medical information. For each category of uses or disclosures we will explain what we mean and try to give some examples. Not every use or disclosure in a category will be listed. However, all of the ways we are permitted to use and disclose information will fall within one of these categories.

- For Treatment. We may use medical information about you to provide you with medical treatment or services. We may disclose medical information about you to doctors, nurses, technicians, medical students, or other personnel who are involved in taking care of you at Houston Healthcare. For example, a doctor treating you for a broken hip may need to know if you have diabetes because diabetes may slow the healing process. In addition, the doctor may need to tell the dietitian if you have diabetes so that we can arrange for appropriate meals. We also may disclose medical information about you to people outside Houston Healthcare, such as family members, friends, or employees or medical staff member of any hospital or skilled nursing facility to which you are transferred or subsequently admitted.
- For Payment. We may use and disclose medical information about you so that the treatment and services you receive at Houston Healthcare may be billed by Houston Healthcare and payment may be collected from you, an insurance company, or a third party. For example, we may need to give your health plan information about treatment you received at Houston Healthcare so your health plan will pay us or reimburse you for the treatment. We may also tell your health plan about a treatment you are going to receive to obtain prior approval or to determine whether your plan will cover the treatment. We also may disclose information about you to another health care provider, such as another hospital or members of the medical staff of the hospital, for their payment activities concerning you.
- For Healthcare Operations. We and our business associates may use and disclose medical information about you for health care operations. These uses and disclosures are necessary to run Houston Healthcare and make sure our patients receive quality care. For example, we may use medical information to review our treatment and services and to evaluate the performance of our staff in caring for you. We may also combine medical information about many patients to decide what additional services Houston Healthcare should offer, what services are not needed, and whether certain new treatments are effective. We may also disclose information to doctors, nurses, technicians, medical students, and other personnel for review and learning purposes. We may also combine the medical information we have with medical information from other hospitals to compare how we are doing and see where we can make improvements in the care and services we offer. We may remove information that identifies you from this set of medical information so others may use it to study health care and health care delivery without learning the identities of specific patients. We also may disclose information about you for another hospital's health care operations if you also have received care at that hospital, and we also may disclose information about you for the health care operations of other providers, such as members of the hospital's medical staff, for use in their health care operations.
- Treatment Alternatives. We may use and disclose medical information to tell you about or recommend different ways to treat you.

- Health-Related Benefits and Services. We may use and disclose medical information to tell you about health-related benefits or services that may be of interest to you or services that may be of purchase or use any particular product or service by notifying Houston Healthcare's Privacy Officer in writing. If we receive direct or indirect payment in exchange for such communications to you, we will obtain your written authorization to use or disclose your medical information before advising you in writing about such benefits or services, unless the communication either describes a drug you currently are being prescribed and the payment we receive for that communication is reasonable, or the communication to you is made by a business associate of Houston Healthcare acting on our behalf and in accordance with a written agreement between the business associate and Houston Healthcare.
- Fundraising Activities. We may use medical information about you to contact you in an effort to raise money for Houston Healthcare and its operations. We may disclose medical information to a business partner or a foundation related to Houston Healthcare so that the business partner or the foundation may contact you in raising money for Houston Healthcare. We only would release contact information, such as your name, address and phone number, and the dates you received treatment or services at Houston Healthcare. If you do not want Houston Healthcare to contact you for fundraising efforts, you must notify Houston Healthcare's Privacy Officer in writing. If you have not already done so, we must ask you each time we contact you for fundraising efforts if you wish to opt out of all future fundraising communications. If you do opt out of future fundraising communications, we will not disclose your information for fundraising purposes unless in the future we receive your written authorization to do so.
- Hospital Directory. Unless you object, we may include certain limited information about you in a hospital directory while you are a patient at a Houston Healthcare facility. This information may include your name, location in the hospital, your general condition (e.g., fair, stable, etc.), and your religious affiliation. The directory information, except for your religious affiliation, may also be released to people who ask for you by name. Your religious affiliation may be given to a member of the clergy, such as a priest or rabbi, even if they don't ask for you by name. This is so your family, friends, and clergy can visit you in Houston Healthcare and generally know how you are doing. This same limited information about you may be made available in press releases to the media.
- Individuals Involved in Your Care or Payment for Your Care. We may release medical information about you to a friend or family member who is involved in your medical care. This would include persons named in any durable health care power of attorney or similar document provided to us. We may also give information to someone who helps pay for your care. In addition, we may disclose medical information about you to an entity assisting in a disaster relief effort so that your family can be notified about your condition, status, and location. You can object to these releases by telling us that you do not wish any or all individuals involved in your care to receive this information. If you are not present or cannot agree or object, we will use our professional judgment to decide whether it is in your best interest to release relevant information to someone who is involved in your care or to an entity assisting in a disaster relief effort.
- Research. Under certain circumstances, we may use and disclose medical information about you for research purposes. For example, a research project may involve comparing the health and recovery of all patients who received one medication to those who received another for the same condition. All research projects, however, are subject to a special approval process. This process evaluates a proposed research project and its use of medical information, trying to balance the research needs with patients' need for privacy of their medical information. Before we use or disclose medical information for research, the project will have been approved through this research approval process.

We may, however, disclose medical information about you to people preparing to conduct a research project; for example, to help them look for patients with specific medical needs, so long as the medical information they review does not leave Houston Healthcare. We will almost always ask for your specific permission if the researcher will have access to your name, address, or other information that reveals who you are, or will be involved in your care at Houston Healthcare. We will not be permitted to receive any money or other thing of value in connection with the use or disclosure of your medical information for research purposes unless the money we receive reflects the costs to prepare and transmit the medical information to the researcher, or unless we notify you in advance and we obtain your written authorization.

- Health Information Exchange. Federal and state laws may permit us to participate in organizations with other healthcare providers, insurers, and/or other health care industry participants and their subcontractors in order for these individuals and entities to share your health information with one another to accomplish goals that may include, but not be limited to, improving the accuracy and increasing the availability of your health records; decreasing the time needed to access your information; aggregating and comparing your information for quality improvement purposes; and such other purposes as may be permitted by law.
- As Required or Permitted By Law. We will disclose medical information about you when required or permitted to do so by federal, state, or local law. In cases where the state law is more stringent than the federal law, the state law will be followed.
- To Avert a Serious Threat to Health or Safety. We may use and disclose medical information about you when it appears necessary to prevent a serious threat to your health and safety or the health and safety of the public or another person. Any disclosure, however, would only be to someone able to help prevent the threat and will be limited to the information needed.
- Authorization Required. We must obtain written authorization in order to use or disclose psychotherapy notes; use or disclose your protected health information for marketing purposes; or to sell your protected health information.

SPECIAL SITUATIONS

- Organ and Tissue Donation. If you are an organ donor, we may release medical information to organizations that handle organ procurement or organ, eye, or tissue transplantation, or to an organ donation bank as necessary to facilitate organ or tissue donation and transplantation.
- Active Duty Military Personnel and Veterans. If you are an active duty member of the armed forces or Coast Guard, we must give certain information about you to your commanding officer or other command authority so that your fitness for duty or for a particular mission may be determined. We may also release medical information about foreign military personnel to the appropriate foreign military authority. We may use and disclose to components of the Department of Veterans Affairs medical information about you to determine whether you are eligible for certain benefits.
- Workers' Compensation. In accordance with state law, we may release without your consent medical information about your treatment for a work-related injury or illness or for which you claim workers' compensation to your employer, insurer, or care manager paying for that treatment under a workers' compensation program that provides benefits for work-related injuries or illness.

- Public Health Risks. We may disclose without your consent medical information about you for public health activities. These activities generally include the following:
 - To prevent or control disease, injury, or disability;
 - To report deaths;
 - To report reactions to medications or problems with products;
 - To notify people of recalls of products they may be using;
 - To notify a person who may have been exposed to a disease or may be at risk for contracting or spreading a disease or condition; and
 - To report suspected abuse or neglect as required by law.
- Health Oversight Activities. We may disclose without your consent medical information to a health oversight agency for activities authorized by law. These oversight activities include, for example, audits, investigations, inspections, and licensure. The government uses these activities to monitor the healthcare system, government programs, and compliance with civil rights laws.
- Lawsuits and Disputes. If you are involved in a lawsuit or a dispute, we may disclose medical information about you in response to a court or administrative order. We may also disclose medical information about you in response to a subpoena, or other lawful process from someone involved in a civil dispute.
- Law Enforcement. We may release without your consent medical information if asked to do so by a law enforcement official:
 - In response to a court order, warrant, summons, grand jury demand, or similar process;
 - To comply with mandatory reporting requirements for violent injuries, such as gunshot wounds, stab wounds, and poisonings;
 - In response to a request from law enforcement for certain information to locate a fugitive, material witness, suspect, or missing person;
 - To report a death we believe may be the result of criminal conduct;
 - To report suspected criminal conduct at Houston Healthcare facilities; or
 - Concerning your name, current location, and whether you appear to be impaired if you were involved in a motor vehicle accident.
- Coroners, Medical Examiners, and Funeral Directors. We may release without your consent medical information to a coroner or medical examiner. This may be necessary, for example, to identify a deceased person or determine the cause of death. We may also release medical information about deceased patients of Houston Healthcare to funeral directors as necessary to carry out their duties.

- National Security and Intelligence Activities. We may release without your consent medical information about you as required by applicable law to authorized federal or state officials for intelligence, counterintelligence, and other government activities prescribed by law to protect our national security.
- Protective Services for the President and Others. We may disclose medical information about you to authorized federal officials so they may provide protection to the President, other authorized persons, or foreign heads of state, or to conduct special investigations.
- Psychotherapy Notes. Regardless of the other parts of this Notice, psychotherapy notes will not be disclosed outside Houston Healthcare except as authorized by you in writing or pursuant to a court order, or as required by law.
- Inmates. If you are an inmate of a correctional institution or under the custody of law enforcement, we may release medical information about you to the correctional institution or law enforcement official who has custody of you, if the correctional institution or law enforcement official represents to Houston Healthcare that such medical information is necessary: (1) to provide you with health care; (2) to protect your health and safety or the health and safety of others; (3) to protect the safety and security of officers, employees, or others at the correctional institution or involved in transporting you; (4) for law enforcement to maintain safety and good order at the correctional institution; or (5) to obtain payment for services provided to you. If you are in the custody of the Georgia Department of Corrections ("DOC"), and the DOC requests your medical records, we are required to provide the DOC with access to your records.

YOUR RIGHTS REGARDING MEDICAL INFORMATION ABOUT YOU

You have the following rights regarding medical information we maintain about you:

Right to Inspect and Copy. You have the right to inspect and receive a copy of your medical record unless your attending physician has determined that information in that record, if disclosed to you, would be detrimental to your mental or physical health. If we deny your request to inspect and receive a copy of your medical information on this basis, you may request that the denial be reviewed. Another licensed health care professional chosen by Houston Healthcare will review your request and the denial. The person conducting the review will not be the person who denied your request. We will do what this reviewer decides.

Your health information is contained in records that are the property of Houston Healthcare. To inspect or receive a copy of medical information that may be used to make decisions about you, you must make a request in writing to the facility Health Information Management Department. The Authorization to Release Patient Information Form can be utilized to request a copy of your medical information. If you request a copy of the information, we may charge a fee for the costs of copying, mailing, or other supplies associated with your request. If you agree, we may provide you with a summary of the information instead of providing you with access to it, or with an explanation of the information instead of a copy. Before providing you with such a summary or explanation, we first will obtain your agreement to pay the fees, if any, for preparing the summary or explanation.

If we have all or any portion of your health information in an electronic format, you may request an electronic copy of those records or request that we send an electronic copy to any person or entity you designate in writing.

Right to Amend. If you feel that medical information we have about you is incorrect or incomplete, you may ask us to amend the information. You have the right to request an amendment for as long as the information is kept by or for Houston Healthcare.

To request an amendment, your request must be made in writing and submitted to Houston Healthcare's Privacy Officer. In addition, you must provide a reason that supports your request.

We may deny your request for an amendment if it is not in writing or does not include a reason to support the request. In addition, we may deny your request if you ask us to amend information that:

- Was not created by us, unless the person or entity that created the information is no longer available to make the amendment;
- Is not part of the medical information kept by or for Houston Healthcare;
- Is not part of the information which you would be permitted to inspect and copy; or
- Is accurate and complete.

If we deny your request for an amendment, you may submit in writing a statement of disagreement and ask that it be included in your medical record.

Right to an Accounting of Disclosures. You have the right to request an "accounting of disclosures." This is a list of some of the disclosures we made of medical information about you that were not specifically authorized by you in advance.

To request this list or accounting of disclosures, you must submit your request in writing to Houston Healthcare's Privacy Officer. Your request must state a time period that may not be longer than six years and may not include dates before April 14, 2003. Your request should indicate in what form you want the list (for example: on paper, electronically). The first list you request within a 12-month period will be free. For additional lists, we may charge you for the costs of providing the list. We will notify you of the cost involved, and you may choose to withdraw or modify your request at that time before any costs are incurred.

Right to Request Restrictions. Except where we are required to disclose the information by law, you have the right to request a restriction or limitation on the medical information we use or disclose about you.

We are not required to agree to your request. If we do agree, we will comply with your request unless the information is needed to provide you emergency treatment.

To request restrictions, you must make your request in writing to Houston Healthcare's Privacy Officer. In your request, you must tell us (1) what information you want to limit; (2) whether you want to limit our use, disclosure, or both; and (3) to whom you want the limits to apply, for example, disclosures to your spouse.

You may request that we not disclose your medical information to any persons or entities that may be responsible for paying all or any portion of the charges you incur while a patient of a Houston Healthcare facility. If you pay all such charges *in full* at the time of such request, we are required to agree to your request.

- Right to Confidential Communications. You have the right to request that we communicate with you about medical matters in a certain way or at a certain location. For example, you can ask that we only contact you at work or by mail, or at another mailing address other than your home address. We will accommodate all reasonable requests. We will not ask you the reason for your request. To request confidential communications, make your request in writing to the Privacy Officer and specify how or where you wish to be contacted.
- Right to a Paper Copy of This Notice. You have the right to a paper copy of this Notice or any revised Notice. You may ask us to give you a copy of this Notice at any time. Even if you have agreed to receive this Notice electronically, you are still entitled to a paper copy of this Notice.

To obtain a paper copy of this Notice, request a copy from Houston Healthcare's Privacy Officer in writing.

CHANGES TO THIS NOTICE

We reserve the right to change this Notice. We reserve the right to make the revised or changed Notice effective for medical information we already have about you as well as any information we receive in the future. We will post a copy of the current Notice at Houston Healthcare. The Notice will contain on the first page, in the top right-hand corner, the effective date. If the Notice changes, a copy will be available to you upon request.

INVESTIGATIONS OF BREACHES OF PRIVACY

We will investigate any discovered unauthorized use or disclosure of your protected health information to determine if it constitutes a breach of the federal privacy or security regulations governing unsecured protected health information. If we determine that such a breach has occurred, we will provide you with notice of the breach and advise you what we intend to do to mitigate the damage (if any) caused by the breach, and about the steps you should take to protect yourself from potential harm resulting from the breach.

COMPLAINTS

If you believe your privacy rights have been violated, you may file a complaint with Houston Healthcare or with the Secretary of the United States Department of Health and Human Services. To file a complaint with Houston Healthcare, contact Houston Healthcare's Privacy Officer, by telephone at 478-922-4281 or by mail at 1601 Watson Boulevard, Warner Robins, Georgia 31093 for more information. All complaints must be submitted in writing.

You will not be penalized for filing a complaint.

OTHER USES OF MEDICAL INFORMATION

Other uses and disclosures of medical information not covered by this Notice may be made in accordance with your written permission or as required by law. If you provide us permission to use or disclose medical information about you, you may revoke that permission, in writing, at any time. Your revocation will be effective as of the end of the day on which you provide it in writing to Houston Healthcare's Privacy Officer. If you revoke your permission, we will no longer use or disclose medical information about you had authorized in writing. You understand that we are unable to take back

any disclosures we have already made with your permission and that we are required to retain our records of the care that we provided to you.
